

### LITTLE WORDS CAN MAKE A BIG DIFFERENCE AN INTERVIEW WITH DOCTOR KAMRAN HAMEED

"I would advise anyone coming into medicine to know fully well that the returns will not be speedy. So one ought not to come with expectations."

When you have an established name, signing up for a task such as that of a Dean is quite risky. What made you choose this risk?

Well, initially I had applied at Ziauddin for the post of Chairman, Department of Medicine. I was quite taken aback when I was offered the position of Dean Medical College. I consider myself a life-long learner. I like to learn. I saw this as a new challenge and an opportunity to learn.

Experiences like these change a person. What would you say about the Dr. Kamran Hameed who was when he started off here and how he is today?

Certainly these experiences are life-changing. I feel far more mature now. I greatly feel that this process has helped me expect too much from people.

Formerly, I was working with a focused group of individuals at AKU. I was the Chairman, Department of Medicine and I was confined to a circle of people solely in medicine. Ziauddin gave me the unique opportunity of interacting with a greater number of individuals of other specialties and even other fields. I interacted with people from physical therapy, pharmacy, dental surgery and biomedical engineering. This, I feel, has enhanced my knowledge which I now believe is more diverse than before. I also feel that I do not expect too much from people either.

"I have already proven to you that I make mistakes like the next man. In fact, being cleverer than most men, my mistakes tend to be correspondingly huger." How far do you suppose this is true?

Well, I wouldn't call myself "cleverer" than most men. In this process, I believe, I may have become somewhat wiser. Indeed, in such a position it is overwhelming how ones decisions tend to affect a greater number of individuals, and so do our mistakes. I have learn that, before taking and endorsing a decision, it is wiser to involve all the stakeholders so that its responsibility is shared and that would be my advice to forthcoming Deans as well.

"Know Thyself". Most people are too conscious of their weaknesses. You happen to be fully aware of your strengths. What would you say about self-awareness?

I wouldn't say that I do not have any weaknesses. I am often apprised of how I am not as assertive as I should be. Then there are certain other things which would be presumed as weaknesses that I do not see as such. I feel quite comfortable in having lunch in the hospital cafeteria than sitting in my office or striking a great conversation with a student. And in fact, I believe this way one is able to keep their finger on the pulse of institute.

### What challenges does a medical student of today face as compared to back when you were a student?

I believe the students of today feel the pressure to earn more as a result of the compulsion to. ### To some, "Medical Education" as an entire separate speciality seems redundant. What are the advantages of having a field dedicated solely for Health Education?

Well, our academicians are from different specialties with each endorsing the importance of their own subject. An anatomist would claim that such and such topics are far more important because that was the method used by their teachers. For example, memorizing a certain number of branches of a certain artery. Likewise, a physiologist would insist on their own speciliaties. So who gets to decide these things? Who gets to ensure the proper course and outcome. I think Medical Education as a separate field is essential.

I do think the approach of using the carrot and the stick approach is at times quite necessary.

# 4TH SYMPOSIUM OF GYNECOLOGY AND FETOMATERNAL MEDICINE











As per tradition Dept. of Obstetrics and Gynecology Ziauddin University held a full day accredited 4th Symposium of Gynecology and Fetomaternal Medicine in collaboration with Royal College of Obstetrics and Gynaecologists (RCOG), Pakistan Urogynecologists Association (PUGA) and Society of Obstetrician and Gynecologists of Pakistan (SOGP). The accreditation was done by the Dept. of Continuing Professional Education (Ziauddin University).

"Medical error is the third leading cause of death", this was quoted by Dr. James Nwabineli, Consultant Urogynecologists South Tyneside Hospital in continuation he emphasized the fact that the reasons behind such negligence are ineffective team work, workforce deficiencies, poor documentation and poor leadership. Dr. James also highlighted that "48% women of varying age groups suffer from stress urinary incontinence. Persistent USI is high in multi-para (21%) compared multi-para (5%).Management can be Surgical/Non-Surgical." "Kegel exercises (Pelvic floor exercises) regularly in pregnancy and after birth can help prevent, improve or cure Urinary incontinence," Dr. Sonia Naqvi, member SOGP underlined the fact how USI can be prevented.

Dr. Noreen Zafar, the founder of Girls' and women's Health Initiative shared the fact that "Pakistan is the top 7 in the world with highest Cervical Cancer rates." Though this malignancy is preventable and requires urgent need of national screening program for cervical cancer. Dr. Muhammad Osama, an infectious disease specialist also stressed the importance of screening and appropriate preventive measures to be taken to avoid severe infection during pregnancy as the risk this group is vulnerable to develop infections due to immunity and physiological changes of pregnancy. Dr. Sadiah Ahsan Pal underlined the causes of sub-fertility and its treatment. "Harmony test can identify 99% fetuses with trisomy 21 and Turner's Syndrome, 97% cases of trisomy 18, 94% sensitive for trisomy 13," Dr. Adnan M. Zubairi shared the efficacy of this newly launched screening facility at DZH.

Dr. Aftab Munir Prof. Emeritus of LUMHS. And ISRA University was the Chief Guest at the occasion and highly appreciated Dr. Rubina Hussain's contribution in the field of Obs&Gynae and all her efforts in gathering the experts for the symposia. The event was graced by Dr. Fareed (President, SOGP) who came in from Lahore and Dr. Aijaz Fatima.

The theme of journal club was 'validation' The speakers were Dr Moyn Aly Director, Masters Health Professions Education (MHPE) Dow University of Health Sciences (DUHS) and secretary AEME Sind Chapter and Dr Shahid Shamim, Director Academics Establishment for Medical education and Research (EMER) and Head Medical Education Unit Rabigh Medical College Jeddah. Dr Syeda Kausar Ali, Associate Professor Department for Educational Development Aga Khan University was convener for the session.

Dr Moyn Aly discussed the process of instrument validation and explained the method in detail; highlighting its importance. Dr Shahid presented an article on validation study, The article discussed how the authors developed and assessed validity of

a questionnaire designed to determine medical school organizational readiness for curricular change. The article presented was critiqued on QUEST criteria. A vigorous discussion followed the two presentations, many ideas were shared and discussed, it was concluded that basic guidelines need to be formulated to facilitate research amongst new scholars. They should be encouraged to follow the steps in validation of instrument to develop practice of following standards; this will also help them in disseminating their research findings at international forums and journals.

# MULTIDISCIPLINARY APPROACH FOR CLEFT LIP AND PALATE MANAGEMENT

ZIAUDDIN CLIFTON, 3rd OCTOBER: A CDE/CME Seminar on The Management of Cleft Lip and Cleft Palate was conducted by the Ziauddin College of Dentistry in collaboration with the Department of Continuing Education Department of Ziauddin University.

Well reputed practitioners from the disciplines of Pediatrics, Plastic Surgery, Psychiatry, Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery, Orthodontics and Prosthodontics presented well-integrated topics on their approaches to the management of cleft lip and cleft palate to an audience comprised of students of both medical and dental specialties, postgraduates, and faculty from various institutes. Of particular mention here is Dr. D.S. Akram who, as a Pediatrician urged on the acute need to provide healthcare in a systematic way with the input of related specialties, to both rural and urban populations despite their distinct differences. Dr. Tahir Sheikh from Plastic Surgery further elaborated the problem of healthcare authorities failing to recognize this problem as a notifiable disease and informed the audience regarding his efforts of providing free treatment of underprivileged patients.

The field of Speech and Language Therapy, Prosthodontics, Orthodontics and Psychiatry were brought to light by speakers who were leading authorities in these disciplines. Ms. Amina Siddiqui, Dean of Ziauddin Institute of Speech and Hearing Sciences provided the audience with extensive insight into feeding difficulties and speech development problem in early phases of orofacial cleft patients and how it is timely managed by early intervention of speech therapists at infancy. The approach of prosthodontic care was elaborated by Dr. Syed Murtaza Raza Kazmi, Head of the Department of Prosthodon-

tics at Fatima Jinnah Dental College, who further emphasized on the usage of obturators and other prosthetic devices to facilitate feeding and speech of cleft patients. Cleft disorders seldom present without dental occlusion anomalies which necessitates orthodontic treatment. This need and process of orthodontic management was explained conscientiously by Dr. Babur Ashraf, Head of the Department of Orthodontics at Fatima Jinnah Dental College. Dr. Sana Younus from the Department of Psychiatry at Aga Khan University extensively addressed the psychological turmoil of a child with a cleft disorder and how proper parenting can lead to such children becoming individuals with strong self-esteem.

The convoluted process of the maxillofacial surgical correction was explained in depth by Dr. Mervyn Hosein, Dean of Ziauddin College of Dentistry. He presented several cases that were surgically followed. Special emphasis was given on following a set pattern and timeline that calls for intervention from all related disciplines at specified stages. Dr. Hosein then called for a panel discussion of all the speakers answering questions from the audience and conveying how illiteracy and myths, lack of proper funding and general lack of policy are the greatest hindrance in provision of the needed care to cleft patients. All speakers expressed aims to start a multidisciplinary treatment approach on the platform of Ziauddin to reach out to patients of the lower socioeconomic strata.

The seminar was concluded with all speakers agreeing to work on a more unified front, aim to develop resolutions and expand efforts to give Cleft Lip and Cleft Palate Disorders the awareness they deserve.
